Coursework focused on key terms and processes in forensic neuropsychological evaluation, essential elements of selected criminal and civil forensic neuropsychological evaluations, components of forensic neuropsychological report writing and testimony, scientific knowledge, and application of scientific knowledge to real-world scenarios. Ethical considerations as well as equity, diversity, and inclusivity considerations were discussed throughout the course.

Program: A three-hour professional training program on the HCR-20-V3 presented by Kevin S. Douglas, Ph.D. offered by Concept Continuing and Professional Studies and Palo Alto University. The HCR-20 is the most commonly used violence risk assessment measure across 44 different countries. It helps professionals in correctional, mental health, and forensic settings make decisions about who poses a higher versus lower risk for violence, either within institutions or in the community, and to devise and monitor violence risk management plans.
